'The semi-truck that blocks my view is still beautiful' is an excerpt of debut evening-length work from dancer and choreographer, Taylor Craft. Throughout the presentation, the performers continuously beckon themselves and the audience 'when evolving into our present selves, what of our past do we keep with us and what do we have to leave behind?' The performance is a series of movement and dialogue-based scenes performed by a fifteen-person ensemble, paired with an original composition by Diego Perez-Cuellar and Sean Monaghan. Allowing her performers and creative collaborators to read through years of personal writings and revisit Craft's past choreographic material to create the motifs and dialogue central to the work. This work is an attempt to reevaluate the past and leave behind what has been reconciled.

"I'm In Here Somewhere" is inspired by the concepts of productivity, taking oneself to their maximum capacity, and what happens as a result of overextending oneself. In a society which emphasizes production, wealth, and "necessary" suffering as much as America does, the choreographer has felt challenged to distinguish her personal ideals from what society has deemed the ideal American citizen. She wonders whether her life would feel more fulfilling if the focus were transferred from what she does to who she is. This piece portrays a group of disconnected people who go through the motions of work-like tasks without a sense of autonomy or individual purpose. They occasionally experience fleeting moments of remembrance – recalling who the person deep inside them is and what that person desires.

"I didn't want to make this, but it's all I have left" explores the desperate struggle between societal pressures to mourn quickly and the emotional need to mourn fully. It is inspired by the shock and deep pain of personal loss and follows the exasperating search for a grieving practice that soothes. Structured in two movements, this solo performance explores the complexities of grief and confronts the exhaustion of oscillating between running from grief and clinging to it as the last memory of what has been lost.

**Meg Paul** brings a wealth of significant professional experience in ballet and Broadway performance, choreography, and teaching artistry. Her thirty-year career encompasses a wide range of national and international experience in performance, choreography, directing, teaching, program development, community engagement, and arts management. Paul has worked closely with renowned dance pioneers and choreographers in the field, from the repertoire and artistic direction of Gerald Arpino and Robert Joffrey to works by Sir Meg Paul Frederick Ashton, George Balanchine, William Forsythe, Twyla Tharp, Dwight Rhoden, and Alonzo King. She is a former principal dancer with the Joffrey Ballet and holds extensive national and international touring credits. Paul performed both leading roles and served as dance captain for Twyla Tharp's

Tony award-winning Broadway musical, Movin' Out. Her awards include The Princess Grace Award, winner of The International Dance Competition of the Americas, Detroit Renaissance Hero Award, Sue Nine Endowment for Faculty Achievement Award, Wayne State University's CFPCA Teaching Award 2020, and the Copperfoot Award. Co-founder of World Arts Inc., Paul's New York City-based performing arts agency celebrated a decade of representing and producing tours for national and international companies, including Nacho Duato's Compania Nacional De Danza, Les Ballets De Monte Carlo, Complexions Contemporary Ballet, Les Grand Ballets Canadian, Dance Cuba, Les Ballets Africains, Washington Ballet and more. As Director of Dance with the Music Hall Center for the Performing Arts, Paul curated and directed National City Stars of Ballet and Broadway, which engaged hundreds of local performers and pre-professionals to train and perform with ballet and Broadway professionals. For her work on National City Stars of Ballet and Broadway, Paul was honored as a Detroit Renaissance Hero by the Detroit Free Press. She curated and directed Music Hall's annual 313 Choreography Expo highlighting Detroit's creative impact with other major cities. This yearly event served as an incubator and career launchpad for many local Detroit artists and companies while fostering artistic collaborations, dance education, and community engagement. Currently, Paul is Director of Dance for the Maggie Allesee Department of Theatre and Dance and serves as B.F.A. advisor and head of the ballet curriculum. Since 2012, Paul has curated and directed the Complexions Academy Detroit Intensive at Wayne State University and at The Music Hall Center for the Performing Arts. Concurrently, Paul serves as Ballet Master and Rehearsal Director for Complexions Contemporary Ballet, Director of Complexions Contemporary Ballet Academy, and is on faculty at Spotlight Dance Works, Viva Dance Co, and Adrenaline, Revive and National Dance Honors Conventions. Paul teaches master classes worldwide and choreographs at the collegiate level and for professional dance companies. Dwight Rhoden's Hissy Fits and Paul's work, seed, both staged and choreographed for the Maggie Allesee Department of Theatre and Dance, were selected for the National American College Dance Association gala performances at The Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C., 2014 and 2016. Paul is certified in Vinyasa Yoga, Progressing Ballet Technique, and Youth Protection Advocates in Dance.

**Basira Norris** (*Choreogrpaher, "Attitude"*) was born into the African drum and dance world where she started her training early. Work with central African drumming include, training on the traditional Ngoma drums ,Conga's, West African Djembe drum and Dundun's. Travelling and performing in West Africa. The knowledge of small instrument's as Shekere, Clave sticks, Nsakala, bell and stick provide the opportunity to perform and teach students rhythms that are not widely known therefore I would call it edutainment. I have traveled with W.S.U to the International Association of Blacks in Dance (IABD) for the past six years as the accompanist for the African Dance classes with K.Prall and drummer for concert. I continue to keep the tradition of the African Arts alive through drum and dance as well as recognizing this was once

an art that was forbidden for females in some areas of Africa, it is important to be a positive representation for young girls, boys, and woman that will observe a woman mastering the art of drumming.



**Jackie Nowicki** (Choreographer, Profound Mystery) originates from Chicago, Illinois. She received her BFA in Dance from Western Michigan University, where she graduated summa cum laude and was named Presidential Scholar in April 2008, and she was chosen as the Department of Dance's Distinguished Alumni for the 2016 school year. She danced for Pilobolus Dance Theater in their PCS company performing for them all over the world, and is certified to teach for their Educational Outreach Program. Her professional credits also include dancing for Mike Esperanza's BARE Dance Company, Calen Kurka's :pushing progress, and Marlena Wolfe's The Wolfe Project. Jackie worked as a part-time faculty member at Western Michigan University's Department of Dance, and for ten years had taught all over the New York

dance scene including being on faculty at Péridance Capezio Center, and guesting at Steps on Broadway and Broadway Dance Center. In Chicago, she is currently on faculty at Visceral Dance Center, Extensions Dance Center, COMMON Conservatory, The Rooted Space, and was a guest faculty member at Lou Conte Dance Studio. Jackie's athletic, daring, and unique approach to movement has also landed her numerous master classes and conventions throughout the United States and even internationally in Rome, Italy. She is on faculty for Celebrity Dance Conventions, Dance Device Lab, Turn it Up Dance Challenge, and Stage Door Workshops, specializing in Contemporary and Improv classes. Jackie is the artistic director of her own contemporary dance company based out of New York and Chicago, NOW Dance Project. Her choreography has been commissioned by numerous colleges, dance companies, studios, and universities including The Ailey School, Elon University, The HARTT School, Salve Regina University, Western Michigan University, Urbanity, the Peridance Certificate Program, Wayne State University, and many more. ### Maggie Allesee Our Namesake



In recognition and appreciation of Maggie Allesee's history of generous support of the arts at Wayne State University and of theatre and dance in particular, the WSU Board of Governors approved the renaming of the theatre and dance department in 2012. They had originally named it the Maggie Allesee Department of Dance in 2000 when Dance and Theatre were separate departments.

Maggie's contributions as a volunteer, philanthropist, and community and civic leader have been vast and varied. An avid supporter of the arts, she has served as a

board member for the Cranbrook Academy of Arts, Birmingham Bloomfield Art Center, Detroit Metropolitan Dance Project, Detroit Symphony Orchestra Hall, Meadow Brook Theatre, Michigan Opera Theatre, Music Hall, Eisenhower Dance Ensemble, Oakland University Department of Music, Theatre and Dance, Kendall College of Art and Design, the Salvation Army Women's Auxiliary, Wayne State Hilberry Understudies, and many more.

In addition to donating her time, talents, and knowledge, she also a generous financial contributor to many organizations, particularly in arts and education. She has given individual gifts of \$1 million or more to The Parade Company, Oakland University for the Maggie Allesee School of Nursing to establish a Chair in Gerontology, WSU for the Bob Allesee (Allison) Endowed Chair in Media Studies, Detroit Historical Museum, Music Hall and \$2 million plus gifts to WSU for the Dance Department, Florida State University for a major statue and the establishment of the Maggie Allesee National Center for Choreography, and Michigan Opera Theatre for the reception room and library. Mrs. Allesee was recognized for her \$3 million gift to Hospice of Michigan with the unveiling of the Maggie Allesee Center for Quality of Life. She has received four Honorary Doctorate Degrees from Kendall College of Art and Design, Wayne State University, Oakland University, and Florida State University.
